




We don't pass offering plates for over a year and we still have what we need for ministry and missions!

When the Moderator's annual report was written last year, little did we realize that the COVID-19 lock down, lock out, social distancing, and face mask wearing was just getting started. But here we are a year later and, as a Church, God has continued to bless us greatly. You, the members and attendees of CABC, have been so faithful in attendance (in person and online) as well as with your continued tithes. There have been many Churches that have had to lay off staff and even close their doors because of finances. But because of your faithfulness, we have been able to continue the CABC ministry with some changes.

Our staff adjusted their work and responsibilities and accomplished the task so that ministry continued in a mighty and wonderful way. God prepared CABC for this Covid time when He brought these staff members to this body in prior years. When Covid hit, they had been working together and knew each other's strengths. As a result, they were able to get CABC online in record time when it became impossible to meet in person as a Church or in committee. As with anything new and different, there were some technical issues but overall it worked and worked well. So, a big, BIG shoutout to our staff for an outstanding effort during a difficult and challenging year.

With the beginning of the new Elder year this past January 2021, the Elders began to look at the way Eldership had been working over the past several years. It seems that the Elder Board had gotten away from the spiritual aspect of Eldership and was serving more as Trustee Elders where we were managing the machine (the Church), not emphasizing protecting, feeding, leading, and healing of the members and attendees. Elders are called to be shepherds and it was felt that the Elder Board of CABC needed to refocus on maturing and protecting those within the Church. The Board will continue to be involved in the business of the Church but we will not continue to look over the shoulders of the Deacon Board. Pray for the Board as we move forward in this refocusing effort. As we move forward into the next fiscal year of CABC, there are some significant changes taking place. Jess Slenker has resigned her position as our Children's Ministry Director, not because she didn't love her job, but due to needs of her family. A search team has been formed and they are currently looking for candidates to fill the Children's Ministry position. Jess' shoes will be tough to fill. Please pray for the search team and Children's Ministry moving forward.

Another big change is the retirement of our senior pastor. Todd has been a part of CABC for 25 years, the last 14 years as our Senior Pastor. As much as we truly hate to see Pastor Todd retire, there comes a time when one season of life ends and another begins. Todd is about to embark on that season knows as "retirement." Elder Board members come and go every year but he has been part of the Elder Board the entire time he has been our Senior Pastor. Todd has shown God's love and mercy to all of us over the years. He has served this Body well and has been faithful to God in carrying out his calling. Thanks Pastor Todd for your loving heart and serving nature.

As Pastor Todd prepares to leave, a Pastoral Search Team has been formed to seek a senior pastor. The team is working through ABCOPAD and with our Executive Minister, Reverend Frank Frischkorn, as we go through the search process. Continue to pray for this group, pray for Pastor Todd and Lori in their retirement, and pray for the staff as they, Todd-less, continue to do the daily business of the Church.

As we begin a new fiscal year, our prayer is that God will continue to bless CABC. We see some challenges ahead in several areas of Church life. For example, trying to get children's ministry programs fully functional again, trying to get the adult School of Christian Living classes going again, trying to get Sunday morning worship back to normal (in several ways), re-establishing a volunteer group for various functions within the Church, etc. We ask that you continue to pray for the staff, Deacons, ministry leaders, and the Elders as we continue to serve together. Pray that the challenges ahead will teach us to trust and rely on God, the One who has the answers, rather than on ourselves.





Missions # 01

While these past 12 months have been dominated with the COVID-19 pandemic, an event new to each of us, it is one that our missionaries around the globe experienced as well. It is a true rarity when we can share living under the same circumstances as those in other countries. It has challenged our missionaries to become even more resourceful as they looked to meet needs and share about our Savior in new, sometimes very limiting ways. Now, being able to reflect on those experiences, one thing held constant - God's love and goodness. The church body at CABC did not miss the opportunity to stand behind these missionaries - always responding with effort, donations, contributions, and prayers when needs would arise. Thank you so much for your loving hearts for the less fortunate! From your Missions Committee, we want to say we are in awe of how much you care and we love working with you to make a difference.

No changes took place with the missionary areas we support, with four local, three national and four international missions groups. Below is an update about each of those, which are the areas that received the \$63,752 provided from our church's 2020-2021 budget:

## Nehemiah Mission (Brenda Jurek)

This past year has been a very trying year because of COVID-19 but with God's guidance, and the loving giving of our congregation, Nehemiah Mission had the needed funds to put together Thanksgiving dinner boxes. We were so blessed that we could make this yearly event happen. Pastor Todd helped me lead this major ministry effort, being the great mentor that he is. He helped me determine how many dinner boxes we could do, based on donations received. We put together 215 meals, with 204 meals given out for Thanksgiving! God was with me through this whole process, as this was my first experience in such a role. He provided wonderful volunteers so this project went smoothly.

As only God can do, he connected me with the Community Progress Council (CPC), headed by Rhonda Contress, also a volunteer. She provides 20 Thanksgiving dinner boxes every year and at Christmas she seeks donations for Christmas gifts for these same families. These families, all in the Spring Grove area, have young children and are on fixed incomes. She collects necessary personal and housekeeping supplies for each family. Through discussions with her, she explained that she had been getting donations through a bank but it had closed. She was happy to hear that we would see if our congregation might want to help. The CABC family ended up providing donations of the items and money to buy others. The extra 11 Thanksgiving boxes were given to Rhonda for distribution where she saw fit. This additional project allowed the body of CABC to show our love for our community in an extra and beneficial way. It was a joy to help fill Rhonda's truck when she came to the church to pick up everything.

I feel very blessed to be connected to CABC and feel the love of everyone there. Thank you, CABC family!

Other Local Missions supported:

Lifepath Christian Ministries (Jeff Kreuer, Board Chairman) The CABC church body extended God's love with many trips made to their warehouse back door in York, These donations from our church body provided food and necessities that were regularly shared online on their weekly "Immediate Needs" list.

Tender Care Pregnancy Centers (Vince Pacelli, Director) We shared the love of Christ through our Women's Ministry's support of the virtual banquet. We also provided clothing donations, diapers, and filled baby bottles. Our MOPS walked their own pathways to support the Walk for Life fundraiser in May.

Youth For Christ (Gary Grecco, Director) With all of their fundraising events cancelled, their team adjusted to the COVID-19 imposed limitations by creating new ways to connect with the area's youth.

Anadarko, Oklahoma (Redstone Baptist Church, Christian Center in Anadarko, and Riverside Indian School) It has been a trying year for the Sullivan and Smith families. Almost all the family members had been diagnosed with COVID-19 at one time or another. Brenda Sullivan has been battling for months and still is on the road to recovery. In the midst of it, they have shared that the love of Christ, through the prayers and support of the body of Christ, has sustained and carried them through it all.

The Redstone Baptist Church has struggled this year, losing several of their older members to Covid. But something to celebrate with them is Pastor Ken and Brenda Sullivan's 50th wedding anniversary this November. The Christian Center in Anadarko, under the leadership of Ben Sullivan, is currently closed. The severe cold temperatures in Oklahoma this past winter damaged some pipes at the Center and help is needed to repair them. The Riverside Indian School has been closed but Laughter Smith is expecting students to return in the fall of 2021.

Alysha Smith (Shanney and Laughter's daughter) is still battling an eye disease disorder called Voght Koyabagi-Harada. She is getting infusions which have helped to stop the progress of losing her sight and reduce the inflammation.


While ministry has been limited, God's presence in the church and community has continued to sustain the families in this area. They praise God's planning to have delivered coats from CABC for both the students and the local community of children – well in advance of the cold winter they experienced. They thank our church body for the continued prayers and support. They continue in prayer as well, praying and knowing that ALL things work together for GOOD!

## Dominican Republic (School at Batey 35 and Elza Phanord at Baraca church)

Although the pandemic caused the school to close for a long period of time, it created an opportunity for ministry to continue in other forms. Thanks to the planning and hard work of the school administration and teachers working with Savenit Polo (who is getting to be a very familiar face to folks at CABC), worksheets were distributed on a regular basis to the kids in the various bateys to keep up with their studies and food was purchased, packed, and delivered to the students and their families. Polo has continued leading this process through the pandemic, with repeated trips to these families in an effort to bless and sustain them.

While the CABC Dominican Republic missions trip was canceled this year, the team that was to travel packed boxes of donated items and the boxes and financial gifts were sent to cover the cost of food that is typically distributed while our team is there. Elza Phanord continues to provide God's Word and Truth along with vital provisions needed to the families she oversees through the Baraca church and Joe Hartman School staff and students. She and Polo are often able to team up to meet challenging ministry needs, which became even more difficult to accomplish this year. Plans are being developed to make next year's trip a very special one. They know how much the kids and people there count on our annual pilgrimage. You will see a video this summer that shares the distribution work of the gifts sent from all of the generous contributions from the CABC and other church families this past spring.

Savenit Polo has accepted an Associate Pastor position at the Maranatha Church, which is a major step in what he believes is his calling to share the Gospel to the people of the Dominican Republic, which includes predominantly Haitians at this present time. He leaves a good position with the sugar cane company to enter this full-time ministry position. Please keep Polo, his wife Racquel, and their three boys in your prayers as they step out in faith to serve God in this way.

Russian Missions (Pastor Sasha)

While it has been a trying year for our ministries, like Job, our focus remains firmly set on the Lord's love for the people of Russia. As Job realized thousands of years ago; "The Lord gives and the Lord takes always. Blessed be the name of the Lord" (Job 1:21). Our outreaches across the Russian landscape have not ceased during COVID-19 but are a bit different. Our radio ministry is reaching beyond our shores to people who have no hope. We met with the head of a public organization called "Sovenok", which assists needy individuals and families. With their help and approval, we offered a pre-Christmas program, which had an emphasis on hearing and experiencing the Good News of Jesus. The participants could hear and feel God's love and power in their lives – for many, it was for the first time.

Additionally, we met with the principal at a school located in a disadvantaged area. He shared the names and addresses of destitute families whose Christmas holiday would certainly be bleak. We shared God's love with every household, giving them previously prepared gift boxes. It was well received and in many cases we were invited into their homes to personally share about Christmas and the Gospel. All to the glory of God! What an awesome and mighty God we have! Praise God! We really appreciate your support in spite of your personal 2020 difficulties and experiences. Together we have seen God work miracles in these troubled times, calling people to faith in His Son and trust in His Word. "From him the whole body...grows and builds itself up in love, as each part does its work." Ephesians 4:16.



Windows of Hope (Jacqui Everett-Forde)

Windows of Hope has been committed to reaching the present generation in Uganda with the gospel of the Lord Jesus Christ for over 25 years. Jacqui Everett-Forde began Windows of Hope to show God's love in practical ways to children who had lost all hope for a better future. Giving HOPE and a FUTURE, one CHILD at a time. The ministry has evolved and grown from the initial baby steps of giving hope to AIDS orphans, with the same children now having a positive impact in the lives of others. God has expanded their work to helping poverty stricken communities and strengthening families and local churches. In addition to her regular duties administrating the school and other related programs, Jacqui is an AIDS counselor, conducts children and teacher workshops, and partners with other ministries in the area.

Jacqui has shared with us that this past year has presented new challenges to solve because of COVID-19. But with God still in charge of it all, answers and solutions were found. Very big news for the students at the Aunt Elvi Şchool, where 300 children are enrolled, is that the new dormitory construction has been completed. The new dormitory for girls was dedicated in memory of the beloved school founder and Jacqui's husband, Wesley Forde, who passed away due to cancer in 2019. Wesley always wanted the children at the school to have a safe and conducive environment for learning. The closure of schools this year due to the pandemic has been very difficult, especially for girls. There has been an increase in adolescent pregnancies, early marriages and gender-based violence. The community is very excited that the girls at Aunt Elvi now have a secure accommodation and living environment.

Cliff's Notes version of this report: While this world may seem to be spinning out of control, God is still in control... we at CABC are doing our best to meet trying circumstances with love and resolve and to create meaningful fellowship opportunities...oh, and hymns are cool.

I grew up in a church where, in the back of each pew, you would find only two books – a Bible and the hymnal. Worship was filled with the sound of a massive pipe organ and the verse, chorus, verse, chorus of many popular hymns. This has resulted in two things: the love for the rich theology and tradition of some ancient words and the ability to often have a few choruses rattling around in my head or having those words spring to mind in a variety of circumstances.

This year, as we look at Love as a congregation, I have had a few of those old hymns spring to mind. At the King's Table, where 15-20 men would gather each month, before we dive into God's Word, we begin with praise by rolling the hymn books out of Laura's office and selecting a few. I will say there is nothing quite like the acoustics of the gym or Pulse rooms to mix the sound of men's voices raised in praise in a way that takes me back to my childhood. There are even times that I can almost feel the deep resonance of those organ pipes in my bones once again.

Throughout this year of COVID and masks and gathering restrictions, it seemed at times as if the whole world was conspiring to keep the church fractured and to discourage fellowship in a way that simply made the church body less of what it was capable of being. In true hymn lover's fashion, I could hear the rousing chords play in defiance of this spiritual battle. "Onward, Christian soldiers! Marching as to war, With the cross of Jesus going on before."

Sure, the coffee and doughnuts were gone from our fellowship time and even the doors were locked for a season while services moved to Facebook and YouTube... but the church of Christ endured. When the building reopened, His people returned. We gathered in small masked groups in the parking lot to exchange stories and encouragement. And that glimmer of hope of Christian fellowship made Sundays a shining beacon upon a hill in the midst of quarantine, lockdowns, and frightening news reports. "Like a mighty army moves the Church of God; brothers, we are treading where the Saints have trod. We are not divided; all one body we: One in hope and doctrine, One in charity."

The church gathered before Holy Week to work side by side to take care of the building that serves us all so well. The young and the young at heart worked to mulch and weed, to clean and scrub, to chainsaw down trees and haul brush, and to fix broken things. Even more than 30 York Marine recruits showed up with SSgt Peterson to clear a path through the woods to our sign and to begin the process of reclaiming our back yard... a proposed site of future church fellowship activities. The Pulse students lent their hands at deep cleaning the kitchen and washing every window in the church inside and out. The prayer garden was open for business again with a facelift and some much needed projects were accomplished around the church, even before all of that work would bear fruit with a complete reopening of the building. There was such care and goodwill shared amongst this body of believers. It was good to see God's plan for his people lived out. "We will work with each other, we will work side by side... And they'll know we are Christians by our love, by our love. Yes, they'll know we are Christians by our love."







No, it hasn't been a normal CABC year of ministry... but the church has persisted. We have grown more intentional about what activities we do plan and what fellowship we create. We have grown more intentional about reaching out to one another, those in our midst, and those who, this year, have been apart from us. One thing we have held onto... God's love is true and because He first loved us, we are to show that same love to one another and radiate it into our communities. "Could we with ink the ocean fill, and were the skies of parchment made, were every stalk on earth a quill, and every man a scribe by trade, to write the love of God above, would drain the ocean dry. Nor could the scroll contain the whole, though stretched from sky to sky. O love of God, how rich and pure! How measureless and strong! It shall forevermore endure The saints' and angels' song."

To continue from last year, we are a year in with our Custodians and they are doing a fabulous job of keeping the building clean and ready for all of us as the building is starting to get busier.

We did have an all church work day this spring on March 13. There was a list of many items needing attention to keep things maintained. Mulch was spread, as well as stone between the buildings. Electrical work, plumbing work, and tree trimming also were completed. We had an offer of help from SSGT Kyle Petersen and his Marine recruits—they all worked very hard and came in very handy for clearing out the area behind the playground and also for restoring the paths in the woods that lead to the CABC sign on Old Hanover Road.

We also continued our work with Aero energy to update our heating and cooling systems this past year. After several meetings, Aero located all of our equipment, documenting serial numbers, model numbers, and manufacture dates. All of this was put on a plan and all equipment was labeled and numbered. The church office can now call for service and let them know the unit, location, and model of what is not working.

There also was a meeting with Aero to develop a plan to update old equipment; several units are 17 years old! We will update our propane service delivery system, with the addition of a second 1000 gallon tank, put pressure regulators on needed equipment, and also make some sizing changes to gas lines where needed. We will do some air delivery changes through zoning controls in the foyer and office spaces. We had much less propane use this past year and so this work will be completed with the funds remaining in our budgeted propane account.

We also will replace one furnace before the start of the school year in the fall and this will be budgeted for in the new budget.

As always, I have enjoyed the opportunity to serve CABC in this capacity. If you have a gift you would like to use in this capacity, whether with practical tasks or task coordination, let me know. We can always use more help.



Shown above is a summary of the General and Missions Funds – the approved budget vs. where I forecast we will finish the year (as of late May). We budgeted the year at a deficit in the General Fund, and while the forecast shows we will finish at a deficit, it is a smaller gap. The positive variance here is due in large part to under-spending across many ministry areas – the largest being Staff, Children, Youth, and Media. Savings in these areas helped to offset giving which was below budget by almost \$9k.

One expense area to highlight is Property. This year we encountered many HVAC issues which led to high-dollar repair and replacements across the systems that heat and cool our building. Without these costs, the positive variance in overall expense shown above would have been closer to \$25k and we would have seen a rise in the General Fund balance during the year. Considering the impact of these larger costs, we plan to do a Building Fund reset at the end of Fiscal Year 2021 and use the General Fund to bring the Building Fund back into a positive balance (current balance is around -\$49,000). While this change will reduce the General Fund balance to a five-figure number that we have not seen for many years, it allows us to begin using the Building Fund for larger capital purchases that should not be hitting our general operating budget.

The Missions Fund summary shows an expected shortfall of \$5,752 for this year. As always, this will be covered by the General Fund and we will reset to start Fiscal 2022.

On the next page you will find the General Fund and Missions Fund budgets for Fiscal 2022 (starting July 1, 2021) that I will be presenting for approval at the Annual Meeting in late June. For reference, it is compared to the current year budget and our forecasted finish.





For 2022 we are presenting the first balanced budget in the past few years. Note that on the income side our expectation for giving is conservative and just slighly above this year's forecasted finish. For expenses, you can see that in some ministry areas we are budgeting back to pre-Covid levels as more programs return in the coming year. This is offset by savings on the staff line. As search committees work to fill two open positions, we have a period of time without costs there which helps to balance the budget. Also included in staff costs is a continuation of our 3-year plan to raise the pay rates for our hourly positions – these rates will change in January 2022. Finally, the

As we continue to focus on financial education for the congregation, I plan to provide periodic updates in Sunday service during the coming year. Also, Don Abbey will be facilitating the next class of Dave Ramsey's Financial Peace University this coming fall.

Missions budget has been set slightly lower than fiscal 2021, as we maintain the level of 15% of giving for this area.

In closing, I'd like to thank everyone who gives his or her time and talent to the finance ministry; the tellers who count the money each week, our Financial Secretary Bev Hess, Bookkeeper Don Abbey, committee member Jeff Seibert, and Elder representatives Josh Trojak and Troy Johnson. In addition, our staff and ministry heads are partners with us in using funds appropriately and I appreciate their diligence in this area! And I'd like to thank all of you in the congregation once more for being faithful in giving to the Lord, so that we can meet the financial needs of CABC and continue to serve Him so well.

And I pray that you, being rooted and established in love, may have power, together with all the Lord's holy people, to grasp how wide and long and high and deep is the love of Christ, and to know this love that surpasses knowledge—that you may be filled to the measure of all the fullness of God.
