

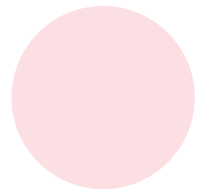

Elder Report

Where has the time gone? It seems as if I just finished last year's Moderator Report and here we go again. In the Moderator Report last year, the impact of Covid and where we were at the time was the top story. Unfortunately, a year later Covid is still a part of our life and it appears that it will be for some time. One of the issues facing CABC about this time last year centered around Covid and how safe or unsafe various gatherings that we enjoy as a part of the Church body might be. But it seems that we have come to terms with where we are and how we react to any Covid issues as they appear. As a result, the Church is starting to reengage as a body, social distancing is gone, lots of hugs are back, and it begins to feel right again.

God has blessed CABC, as a Church and as a people, in so many ways this past year. As was mentioned last year, a team was formed to find replacements for Jess Slenker as Children's Ministry Director and Pastor Josh as our Youth Director. Despite all the hard work by the search team, things did not go as smoothly as hoped. But I have found over the years that God in His perfect timing is not as interested in instant gratification as I am. After a very long year of trying to keep Children's Ministry afloat, we were able to bring Kristine Gardner on as our Children's Ministry Director. This is a part time job, about 20 hours per week. Be sure and encourage Kristine as she moves to do wondrous things with children's ministry.

While still talking about Children's Ministry, I would like to thank all those who volunteered over this past year. It absolutely could not have happened without your willingness to help. I know many of you were afraid to answer your phones or check your emails and texts because it might have been someone (me) looking for help. But almost every time, you readily agreed to assist. It sure made things so much easier. You are a blessing to the Church but especially to our CABC kids. Thank you, thank you.

We continue to look for someone to fill the position needed for the youth. The Elder Board will have met (May 12th) with the Diaconate and Finance Committee by the time you read this to discuss making this position very similar to the one Pastor Josh filled when he came on board. You will hear more about this as decisions are made and we move forward. Keep the youth and the search for the person to lead them in your prayers.

Pastor Josh has been our senior pastor since September of last year (2021). He has blessed us as a Church by continuing to faithfully bring us teachings from God's Word each Sunday. Much of the feedback that I hear is the appreciation for the preaching/teaching that Pastor Josh does from books of Scripture each Sunday. I am reminded of the letter Paul wrote to Timothy (2 Timothy 4:2-4) where he says: **"In the presence of God and of Christ Jesus, who will judge the living and the dead, and in view of his appearing and his kingdom, I give you this charge: Preach the word; be prepared in season and out of season; correct, rebuke and encourage—with great patience and careful instruction. For the time will come when people will not put up with sound doctrine. Instead, to suit their own desires, they will gather around them a great number of teachers to say what their itching ears want to hear."** Continue to pray for Pastor Josh as he fulfills God's plan for CABC in reaching out to those who need a Savior, to those who are hurting, to those who need a welcoming place.

In the Moderator Report last year, I mentioned that the Elder Board was going to spend some time refocusing the Board attention on Church spiritual matters. As part of this effort, we have discussed and studied the role of Elders and we have also begun a study on Biblical doctrines, what they are, do we need them, why are they important, etc. We have only recently begun the doctrine study but will continue as we move into the coming year. Doctrines are Scriptural teachings on theological truths. What are theological truths? It is easy to see the necessity of knowing exactly what these truths are so that doctrines can be faithfully taught and faithfully followed by CABC. Can't teach and live what you don't know.

Earlier this year in a Diaconate, Elder and Staff (DES) meeting, Pastor Josh told those gathered about a study he had read from pastor and researcher Thom Rainer. Rainer had researched and wrote on reasons why he felt that people were not returning to their churches post-Covid. It was such an eye-opener that the DES Team felt that Pastor Josh should speak to this from the pulpit (which he did). Some key points that Rainer made on why folks are not returning to church (and CABC is probably no different) are as follows:

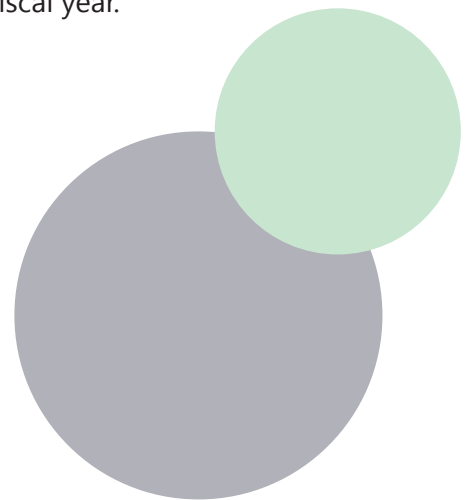
- **During Covid, people simply got out of the habit of going to Church.**
- **Those who felt disconnected from the fellowship of the Church saw no reason to return.**
- **Many who watched services online continued to do so even as restrictions began to go away. Rainer found that these individuals tended to then drift away completely, giving up on online services as well.**
- **Many were only fringe attendees so to stop attending was not too big of a deal.**

The Elders have been looking and will continue to look at what can be done to bring the Church family home. We are attempting to make contact with those who have not been attending to see if there are issues we can address to make their return easier. We have started looking at small groups with the idea to increase the number of groups so that everyone can be connected. If you are not a part of a small group and wish to be, speak to me, one of the Elders, or Christina about joining. These connections provide a feeling of belonging and inclusion in the Church and, as Rainer pointed out, will help us stay connected as a Church.

Pray for the Elders as we work this issue. Do your part as well and check on your friends and family within the Church to see why they are not returning. Hebrews 10:24-25 tells us to **"consider how we may spur one another on toward love and good deeds. Let us not give up meeting together, as some are in the habit of doing, but let us encourage one another – and all the more as you see the Day approaching."** Help your friends and family (and maybe even yourself) not get into this habit of not meeting together.

This year the Elder Board added two new Elders – Michael Freeman and Mark Schumacher. The Board now consists of six men: Michael and Mark, Pastor Josh, Keith Bortner, Troy Johnson, and Herman Crawford. Pray for the Board at all times, please.

Thanks for you for your faithfulness. God bless us as we move into this next fiscal year.

Missions

What an awesome church! That's what CABC is! Let me share some key areas about this ministry year and about the wonderful ministries God has directed and allowed us to support – with your help and prayers.

We recently had a Zoom meeting with Russian Missions head, Pastor Sasha, on the situation in Ukraine. With Russian Missions having their missionaries on the ground right where the need is, it means the funds go straight to them - with the Mighty hand of God overseeing relief in the midst of tragedy. **Pastor Sasha's plea for help for the people of that country was immediately met by our church body and CABC raised \$3,050.00!**

Our annual short term mission trip to the Dominican Republic was the end of February into early March. It was the best trip ever--ask anyone who went! Plans are in the making for next year already, including days with the staff and kids at Batey 35 School, food drives, clothing giveaways, light construction, and an all-church picnic, suggested by Elza Phanord. Elza has been instrumental in planting about five churches in the DR. The picnic will be on a Sunday, the only day the men in the Bateys have off, and gives a chance for families to be together. A new generation is rising up to stand in the shoes of those who are growing older. **Praise God for those who keep loving on the people in the DR!**

Zoom has opened a door to be with our Missionaries where they are. We Zoomed with our Oklahoma/Riverside/Christian Center of Anadarko missionaries, Brenda, Ken, Ben, and Shanney Sullivan during our April Missions meeting. Brenda is gradually getting better from her recent illness and Ben is starting an online discipleship program for the Christian Center. Ken also will help with the program. Shanney and Laughter's daughter, Alysha, continues to get infusions for her rare eye disease. Keep Riverside School in your prayers as they are just starting to let the students off campus.

Tender Care's biggest fundraiser is the Virtual Walk-a-thon, held May 7 this year. They hoped to raise \$60,000.00.

"Grace and peace be multiplied unto you," is the beautiful greeting from Jacqui Forde of Windows of Hope. She says they are facing many challenges with the high price of goods but gives thanks to the Sovereign Eternal God for His protection, provision, and providential care.

Youth for Christ continues to minister to students in our area. **The Break Away Youth Conference in Ocean City, MD drew 350 students, staff, and volunteers.** The past two years have been difficult for students and the conference was a time of love, worship, and rededicating oneself to the Lord Jesus Christ. This organization has been going strong for 75 years!

LifePath Christian Missions (formerly York Rescue Mission) meets many needs. The paper drive CABC held went well and many volunteers signed up to help serve meals at the Mission throughout the year. **The City of York desperately needs our prayers.** As I drove by the front of the Rescue Mission, after delivering some of the donations, a lot of people were lined up in front of the building to get something to eat. That doesn't include the many people inside the building who live there. So many are in need.

Nehemiah Mission did an outstanding job in putting together turkey dinner meals for families for Thanksgiving and delivering them. Thanks be to our Lord for the volunteers and Brenda Jurek for organizing such a much-needed outreach.

I would like to conclude this report by saying this - **what a wonderful body of believers we have here at CABC. You give generously of your love, time, and finances!**

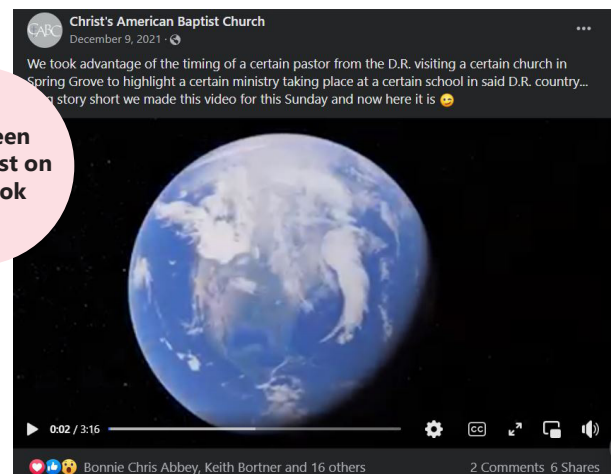

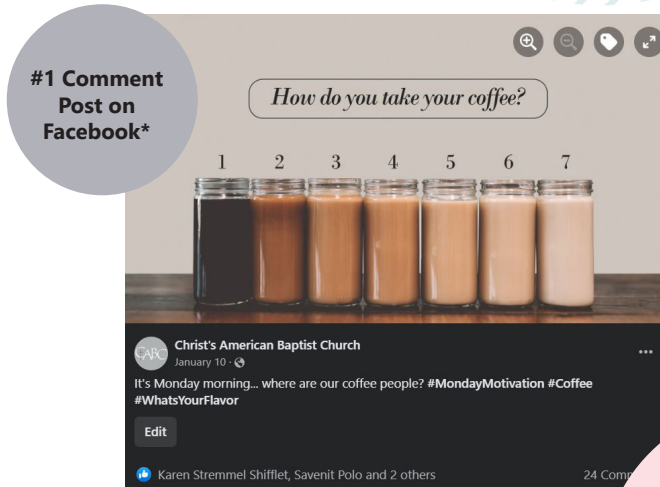

Men's Ministry

I have been involved in Men's Ministry at CABG, in a variety of capacities, for over two decades now. One of our first Sundays visiting CABG, while still trying to decide if the church my wife grew up in would be the church our children would also grow up in, former (former) Pastor Eib (who married us) was giving one of his last messages. During that message, he announced that men's ministry had a new group starting the next week. That seemed a little fast to me to commit to a small group but I knew my tendencies for procrastination; if I didn't get involved right away, I would continue to find excuses to postpone joining a men's group. (Time always seems in short supply but the excuses are plentiful.)

So, the very next week I showed up to the house of a man I had never met before (way outside of my comfort zone) and since then you could say I've been hooked.

I knew that I didn't want to just attend a church on Sunday morning, put in my weekly hour and a half, and go home. I needed relationships, accountability, and people that would force me back into God's Word and give Godly wisdom and guidance as I was fumbling my way through being a husband and a father. I needed men who had already been where I was headed and could point out the pitfalls. I needed men who would provide a loving word when I stumbled... again. I also needed men who were trying to figure it all out right alongside of me. Men who were trying to raise kids in this world of too overbooked schedules and cell phones and social media. **That is exactly what I have found in Men's Ministry...mentors and co-conspirators.**

Men's Ministry has changed since those early days of Mighty Men. I attended many more home groups. I began to help lead a group that became The King's Table and I continue to fellowship with the men of CABG through Marvelous Men (a Christian fellowship excuse we have come up with to watch Marvel movies and eat at Buffalo Wild Wings... God's work!) After the movie, the men analyze the film, bash DC, and swap stories about their favorite baseball team or football player. You know what? Even though I rarely have a clue what the heck they are talking about, I still look forward to those conversations. There is power in watching Christian men laugh and smile in fellowship with one another. I love these men for the impact they have had on me. It is far deeper than I am sure many of them know. I smile and watch their interactions and thank God that I get to be a part of a church family that actually enjoys spending time together.

Through the Men's Ministry, I have met men who have become friends and friends who have become brothers. We dive deeply into scripture together. We fill the gym with the sound of men singing a cappella hymns of praise and worship. (The acoustics in that space are quite forgiving.) We witness men pray in earnest for loved ones to come to know the Lord...for Him to bring healing...and for Him to offer forgiveness. Over the years, we have grieved and mourned together. We have lost powerful voices and watched new ones rise up. I also have gotten to watch these same men, who mean so much to me, begin to pour into the lives of our youth. They take such care to include them and make them feel welcome. Micah has started bringing a group of college friends all the way from Lancaster to join in on our study. They share their insights, ask good questions, and help us finish any extra desserts that may be lying around.

There is a renewed interest in forming a Men's Ministry steering committee this year. Ideas for other men's fellowship activities are already in the works. I am excited to see what will come from these discussions. Ultimately, it is my sincerest hope that we will continue to grow together as the body of the church, focused on knowing God through His Word, striving to love others like Christ would love them, and serving out of the depth of gratitude for everything that God has done in our own lives.

PS. If you are waiting for an invitation to participate in a group like this, consider this your altar call at the end of the message. We weren't designed with the capabilities to live this life on our own. We were designed to rely on God and one another for the strength and wisdom to represent Christ well. There is always room at our table... plenty of food, fellowship, and lessons to be learned.

It has been an interesting year trying to provide some continuity in Children's Ministry with the departure of Jess Slenker. I truly had no idea, no concept, of what went on in Children's Ministry when this all began a year ago. One of the prime things that I have learned during this past year is what an awesome group of volunteers CABC has that serve our children. Everyone who volunteered did so bringing great excitement and love to the kids. Plus, the children were given wonderful Biblical instruction. God's Garage was always a crazy place to be and I, for one, am not sure I could have functioned with all the activity going on back there. They had fun and enjoyed learning from Miss Tina, Kardyn, and others. I would go back to check to make sure everything was going okay or to see if Tina needed anything but never got too far into the room and away from the door. Didn't want to get sucked into all the activity. Crazy and fun room. John and Miranda Sellers alternated as the teachers in Toddlers with Devon Brogan and one or two teens during first service. Again, always excitement in there with lots of laughter and a few tears on occasion. Most of the time, the tears were from the kids. I noticed John spent a good deal of time cleaning tabletops of crayon marks as well as other unidentified stuff. The nursery was staffed each Sunday by a different volunteer during first service, again with the assistance of a teen. The teens worked out well in nursery because they could get up and down off the floor a whole lot easier than the adults. So, to everyone involved in the Children's Ministry on Sunday mornings, thank you. Teens (and sometimes younger), you were great. We could not have done it without you. Thank you.

A big shout-out to Jess Slenker for the way she left things in Children's Ministry. Things were so organized that it did not take me long to figure out how to keep things going. Thanks Jess.

Another key volunteer during this past year has been Christina Hice. She took care of the program that is used for scheduling the volunteers. She was there to answer any questions and help in so many ways. I have had all types of problems with the copy machine this past year, but Christina would come in, hug the machine, and it would hum and print extra bright colors just for her. Thank you, Christina.

The Biblical teaching that I mentioned earlier, except for God's Garage, came from a series entitled "The Gospel Project." All classes, all ages, are taught the same story each Sunday but the lesson is age appropriate. The series runs for three years and then begins again. As a child moves through the Sunday school system, he/she may study the same story a couple of times but it will be at a different age-appropriate level. The toddlers are taught what the A2Jers are taught on any specific Sunday, but at a level that can understand. The teachers have been committed and faithful to this teaching plan. The material is very good and covers both the Old Testament and the New Testament.

This past year, during our 2nd hour Sunday school time, Children's Ministry continued to provide Biblical instruction to our CABC children, visitors, and friends. There was a Nursery during the 2nd hour during most of the year but with only one child, we found that it worked out well to bring him over to toddlers, freeing up two volunteers. The 2nd hour in the Toddler class is primarily a time of play as the kids received their Bible stories and activities during the first hour. There was no 1st and 2nd grade class this year. With only one 1st grader and an occasional visitor, it did not seem to justify two volunteers each Sunday. Therefore, the lone 1st grader was put into Mrs. C's Frogger class (3rd and 4th grades) where she made out fine. She told Mrs. C, "Once a Frogger, always a Frogger." In addition to their Sunday teaching from "The Gospel Project", the Froggers continued to collect pennies during the year for a yet-to-be-named missionary.

On Wednesday nights this past year, Mandy Siegrist and Sara Becker have provided the leadership for AWANA. There were not as many children as in previous years but everyone still had a great time. Lots of Bible verses were memorized, Bible stories were told, and games were played in the gym (thanks Mr. Mike). Thanks to all of you who helped Sara and Mandy this year. It was a good year.

As Children's Ministry looks ahead to the coming year, we can celebrate (Yahoooo!!) knowing that Kristine Gardner is now onboard as our new Children's Ministry Director. She is excited and looking forward to growing and reenergizing the program. Welcome aboard, Kristine!

As I reflected on this past year, contemplating what to write in a report that focuses on a year of continued transition, I found myself seeking some inspiration from scripture. Let's take a few moments to look at Paul's words and see how we can put them into practice as we move into this new fiscal year.

"Love must be sincere. Hate what is evil; cling to what is good. Be devoted to one another in love. Honor one another above yourselves. Never be lacking in zeal, but keep your spiritual fervor, serving the Lord. Be joyful in hope, patient in affliction, faithful in prayer. Share with the Lord's people who are in need. Practice hospitality." (Romans 12:9-13)

"Love must be sincere" - I'm pretty sure that we all can spot a fake pretty easily...a fake smile...a fake greeting...a fake compliment. Are we being sincere in our love toward others? Paul isn't suggesting that our love be sincere, he states that it must be sincere. **We will make Christ known by our sincere acts of love to those with whom we are in contact.** Be genuine in your interactions with those in leadership, on staff, in the chairs (even if they took "your" chair), in the parking lot, and as you go about your daily living. Really struggling with loving someone in particular? Pray that God's love pours out of you as He works out tough situations in your life.

"Hate what is evil; cling to what is good" - There is so much evil that we see every single day. It is easy to become beaten down by the evil in this world. It is just as easy to overlook it and pretend that it doesn't exist. So, what is good? In the D.R., we sang a very peppy song with many repetitions of "Dios es bueno"—God is good. He is who we cling to. In a world of evil, are you drawing near to Him in prayer, in studying His word, in fellowship with believers, through worship in song, in times of struggle, and in times of joy? **Are you clinging with all of your might to the One who is good?**

"Be devoted to one another in brotherly love. Honor one another above yourself" - It is an uncommon practice in our society to love someone with great loyalty and to honor his or her needs above our own needs. We are a selfish society, and this isn't new. Paul didn't make this statement because it was something that came naturally to the people of his time. **He shared this as a reminder of the work that it takes to be devoted...to stand beside and behind and with other Christ-followers for the mission of drawing others into the family.** He gave this as a reminder to people of all ages that it's not all about us and what we want, feel, think, believe, and need.

"Never be lacking in zeal, but keep your spiritual fervor" - I am supposed to have energy and enthusiasm in my walk with the Lord and my fellow believers so that I can maintain an intense passion for Christ? Maybe you are thinking that you barely had the energy to make it to church, or maybe you think that is the job of the Pastor's sermon or the Worship Director's song choice...after all, we pay them to do that, right? Fortunately, Paul is not suggesting that our source of energy is from paid employees or flashy lights or just the right worship song played exactly how you like it. He isn't looking for a fleeting emotion. **The Holy Spirit wants to fill you with life and joy that is unimaginable.** Paul is encouraging us to be so in tune with our Heavenly Father that we are so excited to share the good news with others and to spur others on in their faith.

"Serve the Lord" - It took me long enough to get here; after all, this is the part of our vision for the church that we are focusing on in 2022. This is not a complicated direction. It does not say "Be served by others." Serve the Lord. **This is action. He wants you to do something that points others to Him.** He has graciously gifted each person with skills, talents, money, time, and more. Don't know how to serve? Neither did most of the disciples. Fellowship with Christ, seek His will, and take a step out in faith. Not really feeling it? Do it anyway...fill a need, keep it simple, get involved. Serve the Lord.

I had no idea what to write when I started this but I prayed that the Holy Spirit would guide me with my thoughts and words to impact those who call CABC their church home. Finance Report

Mike Enslen

We're at the end of another fiscal year here at CABC and I have a lot to share with you. This past year has been a good one for the church's financial health, although it is partially due to being short on staff for most of the year. Our income will likely come in lower than budget, but with the large expense savings we have been able to add significantly to the General Fund balance and have a good cushion as we head into fiscal 2023.

Shown above is a summary of the General Fund and Missions Fund, budgeted amounts vs. where I expect we will finish the fiscal year. We approved a General Fund budget with a slightly positive variance but are forecasted to close out fiscal 2022 with an increase of more than \$57,000 to the General Fund balance. As mentioned above, a large piece of the savings was due to being without some key staff positions for most of the year (those overseeing Children's Ministry and Youth Ministry). Some other areas of savings came from Children's Ministry, Administration, and Service/Fellowship. With the expected savings for the year, a group was formed to assess a growing need for improvements in our sanctuary sound system. At the semi-annual meeting in January, we discussed a proposal with those in attendance and voted to approve spending about \$24,000 on the upgrades, which should be completed by the middle of this summer. I will note that this full expense is included in the numbers above. I am thrilled that we were able to use this opportunity of savings to update our system and improve the overall sound quality in the sanctuary.

For the Missions Fund, we are estimating a shortfall of about \$1,800 for the year. This is the smallest shortfall we have had in recent years, and I believe that is due to so many in our body that give faithfully to this area. We have for many years spent 15% of the total budget to support local, national, and international missions and I pray that we will be able to continue to do that into the future. As always, at the end of the current fiscal year we will cover any Missions shortfall from the General Fund so that fiscal 2023 can start with a zero balance.

On the following page are the General Fund and Missions Fund budgets for Fiscal 2023 (starting July 1, 2022) that I will be presenting for approval at the Annual Meeting on June 12. For reference, it is compared to the current year budget and our forecasted finish.

I first want to point out that we are presenting a deficit budget (expected to decrease in the General Fund by about \$2,700). The reason for this deficit budget is that for fiscal 2023 there are 27 pay periods, while a normal year has only 26. This is an anomaly, as both the 2022 and 2023 calendar years have 26 pay periods, and fiscal 2022, 2024 and 2025 do as well. In a year with normal pay cycles, the budget presented here would show a surplus of more than \$10,000.

Developing a General Fund income estimate for fiscal 2023 was difficult. In the current year we have been following trends, and although the trend shows a slight upward movement into the future, our expected finish on income is about 5% below budget. In addition, there is cause for concern about the economy and some believe we are headed for a recession. But being faithful that God will provide what we need to operate the church, I am using

year as a guide, and projecting a 3% lift in giving. The rationale for this estimate includes growth that will come by getting back to full staff, a return to passing the plate in service, and continued financial education for our church body. On the expense side, in addition to the pay-period impact mentioned above, the budget includes an Associate Pastor position overseeing Youth and Young Adults with an estimated September start. It also includes increases for our hourly employees in January which completes the three-year plan to improve the pay rates across all positions.

I plan to continue regular financial updates to the congregation in the coming year and Don Abbey will again be facilitating Dave Ramsey's Financial Peace University this fall. I welcome anyone with questions about the church's finances, or finances in general, to reach out to me at any time.

Closing, I'd like to thank everyone who gives their time and talent to the finance ministry: the tellers who count money each week, our Financial Secretary Bev Hess, Bookkeeper Don Abbey, committee member Jeff Seibert, and Elder rep Troy Johnson. In addition, our staff and ministry heads are partners with us in using funds appropriately, and I appreciate their diligence in this area! **And I'd like to thank all of you in the congregation for being faithful in giving to the Lord, so that we can meet the financial needs of CABC and continue to serve Him so well.**

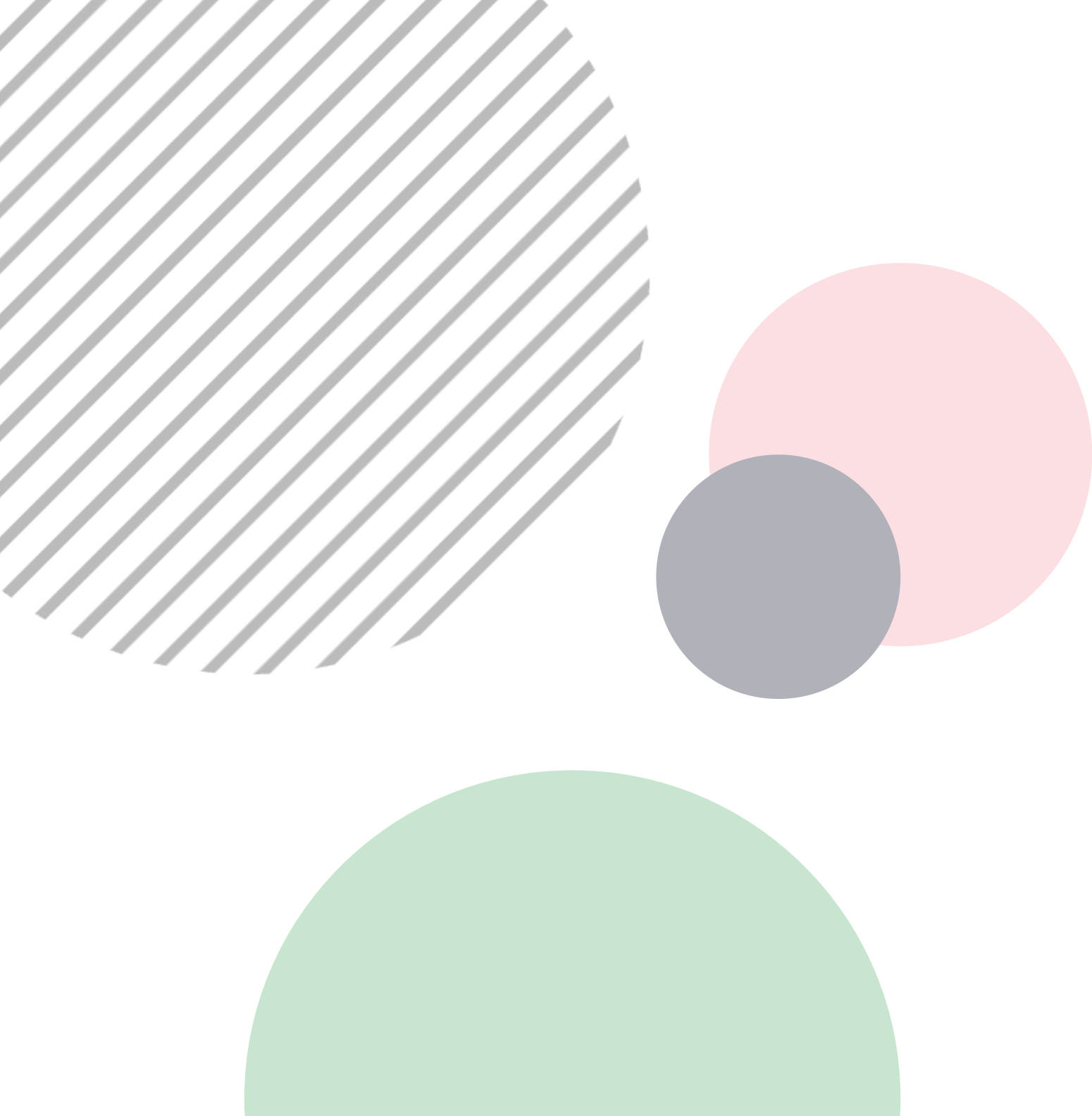
